TIMELINE OF THE SAHUARO MIATA CLUB

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May 1989	US deliveries of the first generation (NA) Miata begin, as 1990 model year vehicles.
Jun 1989	With Mazda's blessing, Norm Garrett, an engineer who worked on the design and development of the Miata created the for profit organization, Miata Club of America (MCA). Mazda provides addresses of Miata purchasers. Dues are \$25 per year, which includes the quarterly <i>Miata Magazine</i> . The club eventually grows to an international organization with over 100 chapters and nearly 30,000 members.
Jul 13, 1989	Carol and Tod Solomon receive delivery of one of the first Miatas in the valley.
Jun 9, 1991	The Solomon's and the owners of 16 other Miata's meet to form a local chapter of the Miata Club of America. Annie Browning is elected President and was designated member #1. Carol and Tod Solomon are designated member #2.
Jun 25, 1991	The Sahuaro Chapter, Miata Club of America, holds its first board meeting. Local dues are set at \$25, to be paid each June. Members encouraged to join the national organization too, but not required.
Jul 8, 1991	The first issue of the chapter newsletter, Desert Trails, is published and mailed to each member.
Aug 1991	Bell Mazda begins longstanding sponsorship of the chapter, hosting tech days, offering discounts, and mailing out the chapter newsletters.
Feb 22, 1992	The Sahuaro Chapter filed to establish itself as a nonprofit corporation.
Jun 6, 1992	First annual chapter meeting and picnic. Carol Solomon elected preseident.
Jun 1994	Membership in the chapter exceeds 100 vehicles.
1997	Garrett and his partner MCA President Vince Tidwell sell Miata Magazine for \$250,000.
Fall 1998	The second generation (NB) Miata is produced for the 1999 model year and by the year 2000 the Miata becomes the greatest selling roadster (2 seat sports car) of all time.
2000	With national membership declining and disputes about the remittances not reaching the publisher of <i>Miata Magazine</i> , Mazda North America forms the Miata Owners Club (MOC) and assures funding of the magazine. The Miata Club of America (MCA) ceases to function.
Feb 2000	Local club memberships exceed 200.
Nov 16, 2000	Tex Earnhardt personally attends club board meeting, offering to sponsor the club. Members given a 15% discount on service, fleet discounts on purchases. Tex given an honorary club membership.
Feb 2002	Local club reaches all-time high of 266 memberships
2002	Mazda discontinues the Miata Owners Club (MOC). Biddulph Miata becomes the club's sponsor.
2003	Miata Magazine discontinued. After five years of posting the local Desert Trails newsletter to the club web site and also distributing via e-mail and the postal service, the paper version is discontinued.
Jul 2003	Low renewals in Jun 2002 and Jun 2003 as local club memberships drop sharply to 147.
Fall 2005	Third generation (NC) Miata produced for 2006 model year, temporarily reversing long sales decline.
Fall 2015	Mazda relies on Fiat to provide critical development funding to produce a fourth generation (ND) Miata for the 2016 model year as well as the Fiat 124 (NE and NF). Sales bump upward, but still only a small fraction of annual first gen (NA) sales.
Apr 2016	Mazda produces the 1 millionth Miata and sends it on a worldwide tour.
2017	Local club celebrates 25 years of continuous operation since incorporation (26 years overall).

Guidelines for Sahuaro Miata Club Runs

The goal is to have an enjoyable day driving your Miata. Everyone's fun will be enhanced by following these simple guidelines.

General

Use common sense and be courteous.

Use Channel 3 on your two-way radio and test radios at the start.

Arrive at the starting point on time with a full tank of gas and a Miata that is in mechanically sound condition.

Be ready to leave on time.

If you are going to meet the group en route or leave the group before the end of the run, notify the run leader in advance or with your two-way radios.

- · During the driver briefing, the sweep driver will be identified. Unless it is dark, the sweep car should be the only car with headlights on.
- · Do not tailgate. It is up to each driver to establish a safe following distance.
- · Each driver should focus on keeping the car behind him in sight. Slow down and let the car behind you catch up. Don't just focus on keeping up with the car in front of you. If everyone keeps the car behind them in sight the group will stay together.
- · When stopping to allow others to catch up, make sure you pull completely off the road.
- · If you want the group to stop, flash your lights or use your two-way radio. If the car behind you flashes its lights, flash yours until the leader pulls over.
- · When we are making a turn and there are two turn lanes, or when we are driving straight through an intersection that has two lanes, use both lanes so we get the entire group through the intersection before the light turns red. Once through the turn or intersection, merge back into a single line.
- · Our line of cars should not dominate the road. If others are trying to pass us, let them.
- · Keep the car in front of you in visual contact before each road change.

The lead car will establish the pace for the group. If you find yourself falling behind and others are immediately behind you, wave them around and fall back into the pack. The sweep car will insure that you do not get lost. Do try to keep up, but don't drive faster than your comfort level or abilities.

· When passing through a congested area where the group gets separated, we will stop to regroup as soon as safely possible before any turns are made.

Check Meetup site again just before the event to make sure there haven't been any last minute changes.

RADIOS for even more fun on a Miata Run

Even more fun on a Miata run? Participants in recent Sahuaro Miata trips have had great fun communicating with each other on the road via radio/walkie talkie. Many radio models are hands free, so you can easily talk on the radio if you're driving alone and they work even where there's no cell phone service. We want to share helpful information on radios in case other members wanted to consider purchasing a pair.

There are two types of consumer radios/walkie talkies, both work on similar FM UHF frequencies.

- One is an FRS (Family Radio Service) radio. These are lower power (.5 watt) radios with a shorter range.
- The other is GMRS (General Mobile Radio Service). GMRS radios are more powerful providing a longer range. A consequence of this greater power is they can create radio interference, so an FCC license is required. A GMRS license is \$70 for 5 years (though compliance with the licensing requirement appears very low).
- There are also widely available hybrid GMRS/FRS radios. These should be set on low power (.5 watt) on FRS channels, but higher power for GMRS.

All FRS and combination GMRS/FRS radios can communicate with each other on FRS channels. So which brand and model should you buy? That is a matter of personal choice. Two of the larger manufacturers are Motorola and Midland.

• Some of our members own Midland hybrid GMRS/FRS model GXT1000VP4. It is also available in camouflage colors or with yellow accents (GXT1030VP4).

One member recommends Motorola hybrid GMRS/FRS models (T400 and T460).

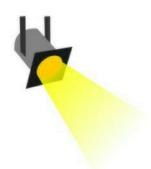
